

RESOLUTION

May 24, 1994

WHEREAS, the enactment of Chapter 64, Title 7, Delaware Code, made the Delaware Solid Waste Authority (DSWA) responsible for Developing, Adopting, and Implementing a Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan for the State of Delaware; and

WHEREAS, the DSWA adopted the current Solid Waste Management Plan on June 21, 1984; and

WHEREAS, the DSWA Board of Directors has identified the need to revise and update the June 21, 1984 Solid Waste Management Plan; and

WHEREAS, a Draft Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan was issued on December 17, 1992 for public view and comment; and workshops and a Public Hearing were conducted in 1993 to receive public input; and

WHEREAS, as a result of review and public input, the DSWA Board of Directors recommended a revised Draft Plan be issued which incorporated public comments and concerns; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors has reviewed the Hearing Officers Report, the Public Hearing Transcripts, and the record generated through the Public Hearing process; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors fully supports an Integrated Waste Management structure, including the continued increase of participation in Recycling and Waste Reduction Programs;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, this 26th day of May 1994, that the Delaware Solid Waste Authority Board of Directors adopt the Final Draft for Public Release of the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan, dated March 1994, as its Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan, subject to the modifications listed below. Said Plan shall supersede any and all previous Plans adopted by the Delaware Solid Waste Authority Board of Directors.

MODIFICATIONS:

1. Chapter IV, Section A.1. "Mission Statement," shall be amended to read "... best serve Delaware and protect our public health and environment."

2. Chapter IV, Section A.2. "Goals" shall be amended by adding a new goal as follows: "Plan a Statewide system which continues to provide programs for solid waste management that protect public health and the environment."

3. Chapter IV, Section A.3. "Objectives" — The first listed objective shall be amended to read as follows: "Design, develop and implement a system for solid waste management which optimizes responsibility for the public health and environment."

4. Chapter IV, Section D.7. "Ash Options" — delete the second paragraph in its entirety and replace with the following: "On May 2, 1994, the United States Supreme Court ruled that ash generated by Municipal Waste Combustion is not exempt from RCRA Subtitle C (Hazardous Waste) regulations. This ruling requires that ash be subjected to TCLP testing, and must pass the required testing in order to be disposed of as non-hazardous material. DSWA shall continue to require that any ash generated by DSWA managed solid wastes be tested and managed subject to DNREC and U. S. EPA requirements."

5. Chapter V, Section B. shall be deleted in its entirety, including Table V-5, and be replaced with the following:

"B. DECISION FACTORS


Several factors must be considered by the DSWA Board of Directors in the decision making process. Primarily, the Board must weigh each factor based on advantages, disadvantages and importance.


Factors which each Board member should consider include, but are not limited to:


- The Public Health
- The Environment
- The Economy
- Employment
- User Fees
- Total System Cost over a given time period
- Conservation, protection and expansion of landfill capacity
- Minimization of debt
- System Efficiency and Effectiveness
- Implementability
- Consistency with the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan
- Legal and Regulatory Considerations




This Resolution is to remain in full force and effect until such time as it shall be rescinded.






